

METHODOLOGY: The <u>World Jewish Congress (WJC) Germany Anti-semitism</u>
<u>Assessment Study</u> was commissioned by WJC President Ronald S. Lauder. Data for the **GENERAL POPULATION SURVEY** was collected and analyzed by **Schoen Consulting** with a representative sample of 1,000 German adults (age 18 and over)via landline telephone, cell phone, and online interviews. Respondents were selected at random and constituted a demographically representative sample of the adult population of Germany.
